

We have come together here in Jesus' name; we have placed ourselves under the word of Scripture, and at the Eucharistic altar, we give thanks for what is proclaimed to us in Scriptures. We most likely do this for a variety of reasons. But underneath it all. I take it that what we do here is in some way explained as a response on our part to our being known by him who identifies Himself as the Good Shepherd. As the Gospel reading puts it: "My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me." What we are about here is the celebration of someone who knows us, because He became who we are. It is not we who stand central here, with the knowledge of ourselves, of our brokenness; that is to no avail; in fact, in some instances, it could be rather depressing. What stands central here is what God has done to us in Jesus. We know ourselves best by His wounds, by His suffering, by His death and His life. Here we are not washed clean by self-knowledge and self-accusation, but because He knows us in his very body and He carries us with Him as a mark on His risen body, as members of His risen body.

If our identity lies in our being known by Him who is our shepherd, because He Himself becomes the lamb, then we also realize that our being known by Him entails an inevitable imperative. Our being known by this kind of shepherd issues forth in the mission to bring about concretely something of the vision of the book of Revelation. We are summoned to accept to solidarity with those who hunger or thirst, who now, in whatever form, must endure the plague of a burning sun or scorching wind, because all are entitled to be led to springs of living water and to have all tears wiped from their eyes.

Today is also World Day of Prayer for vocations. It is obvious that our Church today needs good shepherds, totally committed to the Way of Jesus. We are asked to pray today especially that our Christian communities will be graced with good shepherds and pastors. However, in praying for vocations don't forget to pray for your own. I want to emphasize very strongly that every single baptized person has a 'vocation'. Everyone is called by God to play a specific role in the Christian community and in the wider community. Is it our job, as church leaders, to persuade others to become like us? Or is our mandate to empower Christians to engage and fulfill their Christianity?

Our Christian communities can only grow and thrive when every member contributes to the well being of the whole. It is necessary for us to always ask ourselves, "What does God want me to be? What are my gifts? How can I offer these gifts in service to the wider community and to my own Christian Community? [continued on page 3...]



The Blood of Christ

Letter from Bishop Gary on Reintroduction of distribution of Blood of Christ: On April 28, 2025 Bishop Gary sent a letter to all Parishes, advising that, after "consultation with the Diocesan Liturgical Commission, the Diocesan Health Care Committee, and Council of Priests, [he has] determined that it is now time to reintroduce the distribution of the Precious Blood from the chalice during Liturgies...." This change will come into effect June 22, 2025. With respect to, and in support of, this change, Holy Cross will be looking for additional volunteers to help with distribution of the Precious Blood at Masses. Some of you may have been involved with this ministry in the past and may wish to resume this service; if so, we would welcome your involvement again. Others may be new to this, and we would also welcome your participation. Training will be provided. We will need two additional Eucharistic Ministers for each Mass – or four more ministers per weekend. Dear People of God,

After consultation with the Diocesan Liturgical Commission, the Diocesan Health Care Committee, and the Council of Priests, I have determined that it is now time to reintroduce the distribution of the Precious Blood from the chalice during the Liturgy of the Eucharist to all the faithful. This change will come into effect on the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ, June 22, 2025.

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) has a number of statements lauding the practice of the administration of both species (i.e., the Body and the Blood of Christ) in the Mass. For example:

#80. Since the Eucharistic Celebration is the Paschal Banquet, it is desirable that in keeping with the Lord's command, his Body and Blood should be received as spiritual food by the faithful who are properly disposed.

281. Holy Communion has a fuller form as a sign when it is distributed under both kinds. For in this form the sign of the Eucharistic banquet is more clearly evident and clear expression is given to the divine will by which the new and eternal Covenant is ratified in the Blood of the Lord, as also the relationship between the Eucharistic banquet and the eschatological banquet in the Father's Kingdom (Eucharisticum Mysterium, May 25, 1967, no. 32)

The liturgical principle laid out in GIRM # 160 of making a simple bow of the head before receiving the Body of Christ would apply when receiving the Blood of Christ.

GIRM # 286 then states that the communicant "moves and stands facing the minister of the chalice. The minister says, The Blood of Christ, the communicant responds, Amen, and the minister hands over the chalice, which the communicant raises to his or her mouth. Each communicant drinks a little from the chalice, hands it back to the minister, and then withdraws; the minister wipes the rim of the chalice with the purificator." (emphasis mine).

It is important here to reiterate the above instruction of the Church that the posture for receiving the Blood of Christ is one of standing. This is done to avoid situations of spillage from the chalice. It is much safer for the minister who is standing to give the chalice to a communicant who is also standing; it also allows for easier flow within the liturgy.

Pastors / pastoral administrators / executive committees with their parishes are free to choose if and when they will offer Communion under both kinds at their Masses. Please note that on



occasions when I visit parishes to celebrate the Eucharist, it would be my hope, for all the above reasons of the Church's teaching, that Communion would be offered under both kinds

I am grateful for the patience of those who have been eagerly waiting to resume receiving from the Chalice. And I understand the concerns of those who feel this practice is still too hazardous. It is important to note that no one is required to receive under both species, because the fullness of Christ (the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of our Lord) is present in either of the Sacred Species (Catechism, #1390).

Finally, I wish to say again – it continues to be an act of supreme love for one another to stay home if we are sick or unwell. If you are sick with symptoms of Covid, the flu, the common cold, upper respiratory infections, or any other communicable disease, please do not come to church. This sacrifice is an act of charity, and a source of blessings for both you and your community.

May our Risen Lord continue to guide and nourish us, and keep us holy and safe during this Easter season and in the days to come.
