SUNDAY - December 15, 2024 Third Sunday of Advent

Today is "Gaudete" Sunday, from the first word of the entrance prayer at Mass, which means rejoice! That is what the pink candle on the Advent wreath that we light today signifies: "Be glad! Christmas is almost here. It's not too late to prepare." "Do not worry about anything," Saint Paul tells us in today's reading. Sorry Paul, but at Christmastime, your plea falls on deaf ears. And that prayer at Mass for God to "protect us from all anxiety"—that doesn't seem to be working either, at least not for anyone I know. It's impossible not to feel anxious when you try to cram 20 parties, I0 shopping trips, five concerts, three festivals, two cookie bakes, and very possibly finding a place to put a partridge in a pear tree all in the span of four weeks. Not to mention trying to sort through every family relationship, childhood memory, personal hope, and dream, all with the knowledge that another year is over, never to be relived. Anxiety thy name is Christmas, or so it would seem. But Paul and John say, no, Christmas thy name is joyful hope. Both sentiments convey the sense of unfulfilled wishes. But anxiety implies doubt; whereas hope implies confidence, and joyful hope carries with it a faith-filled certainty that all will be well, that our sins will be forgiven, that no one will go hungry, that our debts will be satisfied honestly, that God will gather us in and spread a banquet before us, and that no one will be mad if we forgot a present or two.

On this third Sunday of the season, Gaudete Sunday, we're also encouraged to rejoice. Maybe "encouraged" isn't strong enough, but "obliged" seems too heavy-handed. We are exhorted to shout and sing by the prophet Zephaniah, urged to exult, and give thanks by the psalmist, and practically begged to rejoice by Saint Paul, who insists on saying it twice. Why this imperative? Remember, it's not an emotion that's required of us nor a simple attitude adjustment either. What's obliged is an acknowledgment that we believe as we say we do. If we believe judgment has been removed, sins forgiven, divine compassion offered, and love between God and us renewed—well, wouldn't we crack a smile at least? Even God is so happy that we're back together again that God sings joyfully over the idea, as heartily as one sings at festivals. If God's happy about it, shouldn't we be, too?

In our affluent society, the sin rarely referred to is avarice. We redefine it as ambition, upward mobility, or simply "doing well." But the clutch of personal possessions is still the spiritual stranglehold it always was. The needle's eye isn't getting any bigger, and our modern camels still won't pass through. John has some wonderful advice for us! "Master, what should we do?" our situation is very different, but the question is the same. Should we go along with the world, or refuse to be part of it? John's answer is a wise answer. Don't be a glutton or a Scrooge. Act justly and with honesty. Be generous. Protect and do not exploit the weak and those in need. Give with joy. This is a time when it is very easy to think only of our own wants and pleasure, but just as easy to give from full and joyous hearts to others: to the sick and the lonely, to the homeless poor, to the refugee and the seeker after asylum, to those who are abused and neglected. John's answer is profound because it is so simple. Just do what you do and do it honesty and well. Just do what you already know to be right. Just do it. John the Baptist offers several key remedies. First, share what you have with those who don't have. Second, don't cheat, ever. Third, don't keep striving for more. Finally, be humble. These remedies for avarice are countercultural. They also prepare the way of the One who is coming.

WORD OF THE WEEK:

O Antiphons

From Greek meaning "sounding against," seven short scripture verses, sung or chanted at Vespers, often in divided choirs, during the week before Christmas, December 17 to 23. Each Antiphon invokes Christ by means of an Old Testament symbol: O Wisdom, O Sacred Lord, O Flower of Jesse's Stem, O Key of David, O Radiant Dawn, O King of All Nations, and O Emmanuel. The O Antiphons (also known as the Great Advent Antiphons or Great Os) are sung verses used in evening prayer during the last seven days of Advent (December 17-23) at the beginning and end of the Magnificat, a hymn of praise spoken by Mary. Rendered in order, in Latin and English, the O Antiphons are: O Sapientia (O Wisdom), O Adonai (O Lord), O Radix Jesse (O Root of Jesse), O Clavis Davidica (O Key of David), O Oriens (O Radiant Dawn), O Rex Gentium (O King of Nations), and O Emmanuel (O God-with-us). As an acrostic, the Latin version reads SARCORE, reversed as ero cras ("I will be tomorrow"). Since the Antiphons are traditionally chanted December 17-23, Jesus is literally born "tomorrow" at the chant's conclusion. The O Antiphons have been around at least since the eighth century, when monks would sing them. Even if you don't pray the Liturgy of the Hours, these Antiphons may sound familiar. This is because they were incorporated into one of the best-known hymns of the Advent season: "O Come, O Come Emmanuel."

If we rest each evening with the O Antiphons, . . . Advent will be for us once again a time of God's great love and hope. It's tempting to treat the two Testaments of our Bible as the "before" and "after" of religious understanding for Christianity. In the contemplation of the great O Antiphons, we discover that the divine revelation we recognize as Jesus has been within the story of God's people from the beginning.

From Learning from the O Antiphons by C.C. Pecknold: The O Antiphons were certainly in regular use by the time of Charlemagne in the eighth century. "They prepare us for the great Vigil of Christmas, uniting Israel's hopes, and the desire of nations as a kind of prophetic summa in praise of divine providence. In the heart of winter's darkness, the O Antiphons call us to worship Jesus Christ as the center of salvation history wrote Madeleine L'Engle" The O Antiphons proclaim the coming Christ as the fulfillment not only of Old Testament hopes, but our present desires as well wrote Grace Hetzel. The O Antiphons accompany the Advent evening prayer of Mary's Magnificat. These short, sung phrases remind us of our need for salvation and our desire to embody the divine characteristics of our Savior. Today we pray for knowledge. This is not the knowledge that wins arguments around the dinner table, but the knowledge that shines a light on who we are, where we came from, and what we are called to do as followers of Christ.
