SUNDAY - February 14, 2021 Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

If you think Quarantine is hard on relationships now...imagine if you had leprosy in biblical times? The most isolating form of illness in Jesus time was leprosy (Hanson's disease) and lepers had to live apart isolated for community. The person who suffered from leprosy was called in some circles the "son of death. "Because of the danger of contamination, and because they were officially declared unclean, lepers lived in segregated areas. Ostracism was the religious response to the marks of sin. This had all sorts of ramifications. They could not enter Jerusalem, the holy city. Out of desire to protect their own health, none would encounter them. They were forbidden to bring offerings to the temple and to pray for their healing, because the sacred place was for the healthy: the clean. Above all else, they certainly could not contaminate this holy place, for how could anyone who lived under the curse of God dare to come into God's presence in the temple.

But look what happens when a leper, in desperation, breaks through all the social and religious conventions and throws himself at the feet of Jesus! How does Jesus react? The Gospel says: "Jesus was moved with pity." Jesus touches the leper: an immensely warm gesture; yet one that gives you cold shivers to think about. "Of course, I want to", Jesus says. "Be cured." It is an echo of that beautiful creation word that must have been like music in the empty world of the leper." By touching the leper, and by recklessly ignoring the danger of being contaminated, Jesus flatly contradicts the religious people who believed in the fallacy that a leper lives under the curse of God. With that gesture, Jesus underlines his will to heal and God's will to bring life and salvation. By sending the cured man to the priests who were defenders of the true faith, Jesus puts an end to the religious fallacy that the temple, God's abode among people, would have no room for wounded and hurting people.

What today's Gospel passage leaves us with is an uncomfortable question: "Do the lepers of our time find a welcome among us who may pride ourselves on being disciples of Jesus?" We would like to think we are more civilized now, that we do not insist that our modern lepers just cover themselves up and go away. Regretfully the homeless, the mentally ill, and addicts and unemployed and desperate unseemly others that fall through the tears in our social fabric, are all still there tempting us to see them as unfit for our society and possibly for God's. We still mix sin and suffering together in our minds and presume with Job's "friends" that he has somehow called down all this misery on himself. Jesus never approached an outcast with any kind of moral assessment. He saw the mark of suffering, and he willed it—not the person—to disappear. In the New Testament, forgiveness gets a whole new spin.

Dear friends, the words of the leper who approached Jesus--"if you wish, you can make me clean"-could be those of anyone of us in need of love in this time of isolation and loneliness? We are all in need of healing and Jesus touch and we can also give it to others in these difficult days. Lent begins next week. We have some resources at office and in church for you to pray your way through Lent.


