Holy Cross Catholic Parish Twinning with St. Patrick's Parish

SUNDAY - July 7, 2024 Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

In this Sunday's gospel, Jesus returns to his hometown to proclaim the message that's begun to be well received far and wide. But the hometown folks can't get past their preconceived notions of Jesus. "Hey, we know all there is to know about this guy. Who does he think he is?" Because of their shortsightedness, they missed out on the Good News that Jesus embodies. "Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account," Jesus famously taught in his Sermon on the Mount. And he should know, because Jesus faced precisely this kind of treatment at his debut in Nazareth. Folks didn't simply disapprove of his teaching. They questioned his credentials and even his paternity (being called the "son of Mary" was irregular in a land where your father's lineage was paramount). In fact, the opposition got rather physical, if you include nearly being hurled off a cliff at the end of the lesson. Their lack of belief was the cause of His not being able to do the signs and mighty deeds they were seeking. The "honor" for which He was asking them was not based on locale or family ties, but on accepting Him as The One Who is Sent. He leaves the temple, but to add to their confusion, Jesus does heal a few by touching them, but departs as amazed at their lack of faith as they are amazed at His unpredictable behavior. We have these two, Ezekiel and Jesus showing up just being who they are. Both know they are going to be resisted for just being who they are and how they do who they know themselves to be.

Talking to God can be a lot of trouble, and hearing from God maybe worse. But you know what's worst of all? A world in which God's voice is not heard at all. A world in which Jesus himself walks into a house of prayer and his own community doubts him. That didn't just happen once in Nazareth, unhappily. It happens all the time. If you look around our Church, you see several images honoring Jesus: a central crucifix, the Stations of the Cross, statues, an icon, a votive stand and other sacramental's of beauty such as the tabernacle. The tabernacle essentially houses the true presence of Christ in our midst. Honor and worship, though, is easy. Discipleship is hard. Living it is a challenge and the prophets are ones that lived it. They were amazing conduits of grace!

Faith is to believe despite all evidence to the contrary. Do we believe that a single task as Christians is to practice our faith, to train our minds to believe, even when the evidence suggests otherwise. What scripture invites us to do today is not simply to bow but to listen. Listen for the voice that still brings the word of God into the world. It will not shout out loud or break a bruised reed. It whispers, an indwelling Spirit that longs to speak directly to your heart and mine. Listen. The prophets were clear that God was continuing to work in the universe and in all history. Ezekiel, Jeremiah, Jesus all showed up, because they had all received well their persons and their missions. They did not care about what others were saying about them, because they knew what they, themselves, were saying about themselves. There have been many prophetic persons in my life, telling me, pushing me, slowing me down, building me up and often it took me time to hear, receive, take it to heart and so begin to show up with the simpler self which helps me offer others their good truths. It is not for me as a preacher to judge others on this score. But on the one hand, I would be an unfaithful preacher if I did not point to that aspect of the Gospel message as well. But then not as a word of judgment or condemnation, but as a word of vigilance, a summons to an ever-increasing faith in Jesus, so that, when our time comes, Jesus can say to each one of us: "Welcome home, you faithful disciples". We can take encouragement from Paul in the Second Reading today. We need to learn what St. Paul proclaimed so clearly about his own experience when he discovered how weak he was, when he discovered how powerless he was. He said: I am blessed because when I am powerless, when I am most powerful.

Penitential Act

A short rite recognizing our failures that is part of the opening rite of the Mass. Sometimes the Penitential Act includes the Confiteor ("I confess to almighty God") or the Kyrie ("Lord have mercy"). Another suitable prayer may also be used. The Penitential Act opens with an introduction from the priest. He invites the whole community—himself included—to acknowledge their sins. This honest look inside ourselves during the Penitential Act helps us to be aware of our sin and our need for God to help us overcome sin. The Penitential Act is a recognition that God is merciful, and we need mercy. Admitting fault is the antidote to self-justification. I'm a sinner! And, thanks be to God, forgiven.


