Twinning with St. Patrick's Parish

SUNDAY - March 10, 2024 Fourth Sunday of Lent

The days are getting longer. March is flying by and already there is light. We have longer daylight to look forward to, especially when the clock went forward this weekend. With the increase in light, there is also an increase in growth. The blossoms of spring have already come out. Nature is coming to life after a time of hibernation. Today's gospel echoes what is happening in nature, for 'light has come into the world.' The light refers to God's revelation brought into the world by Jesus. Both St Paul and the gospel declare that God's light is the light of love. God's love is on full display in today's readings.

We are well into Lent. You could call it our journey through the desert, our journey to Easter, the light and the new life. We Christians go this path like everyone else, like ordinary people; like men and women who are marked by everything that happens in our world. There is a lot of misery, a lot of sin, a lot of powerlessness, a lot of hostility, a lot of not knowing where we are going. We do indeed live in a world where it is so easy to be a cynic and despair about what is truth. I guess it is all part of our life story. Of course, we have our good times as well. We have moments of happiness, of peace, of love, of a sense of purpose. But, as Christians, we are not protected from the disillusionment of life. We see dreams being shattered; if not in ourselves, then in others as is the case in the Middle East, Ukraine, Haiti, Sierra Leone. Closer to home, we are all edgy about politics on the North American continent. It is moments like these that we can hear ourselves say: "where is our God? Does he really care?" Perhaps we would not dare to say it, but don't we often think:" what is the use of being Christian in a world where you have to fend for yourself, where you should not get your expectations too high, because you are bound to get hurt and disillusioned?"

Jesus himself appears on our path today and he points us to the cross on which he will be lifted up. The cross signifies for us that God's entire existence is one of being given for us. With that kind of God in our lives, we will not have to go under.. Jesus wanted the example of his commitment to inspire us to believe in God's love and allow it to touch and transform us. Jesus on the cross is the exemplar par excellence of a life of commitment; his example gives us the courage to imitate him in our own lives. The cross is the ultimate example of God's love for the world.

When Nicodemus sought out Jesus, he was in the dark "both really and symbolically. He could not see clearly. In the years that followed this late-night conversation, Nicodemus became a follower of Jesus and, step by step, was drawn to see things differently. At last, he finally *did* see. When at the end, Jesus was really and truly lifted up, Nicodemus was not too far away. When we meditate on the crucifix and participate in the Eucharist we also see Jesus lifted up. Today as we lift our eyes to see him, I might ponder on the mystery of suffering and exaltation and wonder at the love that is lifted up and draws us ever closer, uplifting us as well. Rebbe Nachman of Breslov, The Empty Chair writes...I believe that I can return, no matter how far I have strayed. I believe that I have the inner strength to change. I believe that I can become truly devoted and close to God.

Word of the Week:

Joy

A fruit or mark of the activity of the Holy Spirit in the life of the faithful. While pleasure comes through the senses and happiness from human interaction, Christian joy is experienced in loving God and neighbor. Venerable Fulton J. Sheen once divided the world into those who have found God and those who are still hungering, thirsting, and seeking. Religious practices in themselves may or may not bring a person to genuine holiness. But the life that exhibits true **joy** proves to be radiant with the life of God. From Gaudium et spes, the Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World: "The Lord is the goal of human history, the focal point of the longings of history and of civilization, the center of the human race, the joy of every heart and the answer to all its yearnings." Most of us aren't crazy about being told to "cheer up." Yet today is called Laetare ("rejoice") Sunday because even though it's Lent, the church urges us to cheer up in the words of Isaiah 66:10: "Rejoice with Jerusalem all you who love her." We may feel affection for the memory of biblical Jerusalem or concern for the current sorrows of the city. But it's the heavenly city, where justice and peace reign, that gives us reason to rejoice.
