Twinning with St. Patrick's Parish

SUNDAY - March 19th, 2023 The Fourth Sunday of Lent

In today's Gospel the miracle of the once-blind man's sight restored takes only a few verses--but the lesson is driven home in cycles as the healed man grows in spiritual insight and Jesus' foes similarly grow more and more blind. Jesus meets a man who inhabited a dark place. It speaks of the cure of the person who has been blind from birth. In the Gospel of John, this kind of story usually has a double layer: the surface layer is about the cure from blindness to sight; the second layer is about how one comes from unbelief, from living in blindness, to faith in Jesus, who is the light of the world. In sharp contrast with the person born blind, there are the Pharisees who close themselves off from Jesus. Their claim is that they can get by without Jesus. The judgment that Jesus pronounces over them is awesome: "Since you say, "We see", your sin remains."

In the story, both the person born blind, and the Pharisee are nameless. This is both a device used so that we may recognize ourselves in the blind person who comes to faith in Jesus, or in the Pharisees who refuse to believe. Is there not something of the two sides in all of us? The church sees in the story a baptism lesson. The pool of Siloam, in which the blind person washes himself and regains his sight, is the baptismal font. We are on our way to Easter at which time we will have our being baptized renewed. That makes today's Gospel a very fitting story to help us see how we respond to Jesus as the light of the world. Do we allow ourselves to be cured from our blindness so that we may come to see, or do we have no use for Jesus and remain in our blindness?

As far back as the earliest days of the church, the third, fourth and fifth Sundays of Lent have been the occasion when the catechumens are introduced to the mysteries of the faith they will profess at their Baptism on Holy Saturday evening, a faith that we heard Jesus offer the Samaritan woman last week and the man born blind today. Today they pray for the light to see, to see, that is, with the eyes of faith, and next week as they contemplate the raising of Lazarus from the dead, they will pray for new life, the new life of Baptism. After their Baptism they will be sent forth to evangelize, to tell others about the wonderful things God has done for them, like the Samaritan woman, like the man born blind, like Lazarus. And in the telling they will grow. They will grow in knowledge and love.

Dear friends, these readings are not just for our catechumens and candidates; they are for us are well. As we listen to them on these Sundays we must ask ourselves three questions: "How do we thirst? How are we blind? How are we dead?" And we must ask the Lord to heal our blindness and give us life. It's the gift of God's grace that is freely offered. We have only to open our hearts to receive it. But we must always remember. It is a gift that is not meant to be clutched and hoarded selfishly. It is a gift that grows in us only in the measure that we are willing to share it with others.
