SUNDAY - March 24, 2024 Passion Sunday

Palm Sunday marks our entrance into Holy Week and the time of Jesus' Passion and the most sacred time in our lives as Christians. The entire range of human emotions come into play in the readings today, evoking connections with those of us who have experienced loss, failure, misunderstanding, injustice, illness, temptation, abandonment, and betrayal, as well as courage in the face of danger and faithfulness in the face of even death. Here, dear friends, the entirety of humankind's religious and emotional sensibilities is presented in stark form. All the characters in the story run the gamut of humanity's fickleness. We meet good, bad, and confused people. There is the drama of love mixed with hate, friendships betrayed, greed, false accusations, denials, lying, pride, arrogance, tenderness, and compassion. Life is starkly presented here and deep down we prefer to identify with the courageous, non-violent Jesus, who draws us to him with a love that can only emanate from God Himself.

The Passion narrative is so enthralling on its own terms it can be difficult to keep in mind that it is not simply a drama about the death of Jesus. Gospel stories are deliberately told in a way that always invites us to find our place in the story. So, we, too, must choose, Mark says with each comparison. Never is that more apparent than in the Passion account, where marvelous characterizations offer early church members—and modern ones, too—the opportunity to decide whether courage or cowardice will mark their own discipleship. On the Mount of Olives Jesus said three things would happen: His disciples would flee; one of his closest disciples, Peter, would deny knowing him not once but three times; and after his resurrection he would go ahead of his band of followers to Galilee. Put yourself in the shoes of Mark's original audience: "Would I have distanced myself from Jesus, both physically and spiritually? Would I have gone to Galilee with the hope of seeing him?" Then put yourself back in your own shoes and ask: "When have I run away from Christ? Where do I go to meet him? Those who leave the side of Jesus in the critical hour are truly naked and vulnerable. Mark asks us to contrast that image with that of Jesus, sitting at supper, saying, "Take it; this is my body." Take it, and never forsake it.

The story we have just heard invites us to identify with those who saw Jesus with the eyes of faith and love, who recognized the light of God in the darkness of Jesus' passion and death. When we look upon the passion and death of Jesus with such eyes, we see a divine love that is stronger than sin, a divine light that shines in all our darknesses, a divine power that brings new life out of all our deaths, a divine poverty that enriches us at the deepest level of our being. We have heard the story of Jesus' last journey told in the space of ten minutes. This Holy Week, the church invites us to travel that journey at a much slower pace, day by day as it were. We are invited to enter into that journey with the eyes of the anointing woman, the centurion, Joseph of Arimathea and the group of faithful women. We look beneath the surface of what is happening, we listen deeply to all that is taking place, so as to recognize

the good Shepherd who laid down his life for us all, so that we might have life and have it to the full.

Let us walk slowly into Holy Week

Word of the Week: PROSTRATION

Lying face down in a ritual expressing humility, reverence, and submission. Used in the liturgy of ordination, it is also the posture assumed during the entrance ritual on Good Friday when priests and ministers proceed in silence and then reverence the altar before all assembled with a full **prostration**. Postures are powerful. We say much without saying a word. Genuflection and kneeling demonstrate respect. The Asian kowtow-kneeling while touching forehead to the The ground—is deeper display of reverence. а rare full prostration symbolizes total submission to God alone. The ultimate prostration of Jesus on the cross brings about our salvation. From the Circular Letter Concerning the Preparation and Celebration of the Easter Feasts: This act of prostration [on Good Friday], signifies both the abasement of "earthly man" and also the grief and sorrow of the Church.
