SUNDAY - March 28th, 2021 Sixth Sunday in Lent - Passion Sunday

When they had sung the hymn they went out to the Garden of Gethsemane. Jesus withdrew a short distance and prayed. The Agony in the Garden, the first Sorrowful Mystery of the Rosary, has always affected me deeply. It is so full of emotion and complexity, difficult to fully grasp and harder to imitate. In his prayer, Jesus fully divine and fully human completely grasps and experiences the sufferings, misery, trials of all his brothers and sisters, those who have gone before, those of his time and those yet to be born. So completely did he unite himself with all suffering that he fell under its excruciating pain. At the same time he was aware of the evil intentions of the scribes, Pharisees and chief priests. He had long endured their rejection and jealousy. He knew that they wanted to kill him and were looking for the opportune time to rabble-rouse the crowd into an angry frenzy to demand, "Crucify him". As he prayed, Jesus knew his father had sent him on a mission of love, a mission salvation, not a mission of death. In anguish calling on his father, for whom he knew all things were possible, he prayed that the cup of suffering might be removed from him, yet he trusted God and would stay faithful to his Father as the course of events remained unaltered.

The words of his father are not recorded in scripture but I wonder if maybe he said something like this to Jesus, "My dearest son, you came to live among your brothers and sisters as one of them to show them the way of love, of hope and trust, of repentance and mercy, to search out the lost and offer them forgiveness and salvation, to carry their burdens with them, to give them new life through the good news of the kingdom that they would choose to live out of the divine within each of them. But in their fear and hatred they seek to kill you. I weep with you; grieve with you in the deepest sorrow that you hold in your heart for them as they turn away from your way of love. I love you; I am always with you; I will never leave you. I will walk this path with you; I will suffer with you; I will bear your pain with you. Your life and now your death will destroy death's bondage forever; it will become redemption and reconciliation, a model of pure love for all." Thus, Jesus became innocence – alone, betrayed, abandoned, denied; innocence - found guilty, humiliated, ridiculed; innocence - tortured, crucified, died.

How many times have I tried to understand how Jesus could possibly pray in uncompromised trust and acceptance and unflinching faithfulness to his Father, knowing that his father could do all things, yet, he could see clearly the road of unimaginable, innocent suffering and death that lay before him, awaited him. From the scriptures a picture emerges. As a child Jesus learned his Jewish faith, traditions and culture from his parents, Mary and Joseph, from his community, from the temple priests. He pondered the scriptures, the God of our Old Testament, listened intently to the words of the prophets and the psalms and he prayed. He learned and he grew in wisdom and knowledge. When he was but an adolescent and his parents found him in the temple and told him how they were worried about him he said, "Did you not know I must be about my FATHER'S business." From this early age Jesus knew God as Father! Later we hear him say, "The Father and I are one." "Apart from the father I can do nothing....." Jesus was coming to understand that though he was fully human, he was also fully divine. His relationship with his father became total commitment, trust and love; his will was inseparable from his father's will. He experienced every day in his humanity but he did not live out of his humanity. He lived out of the divine. (cont'd on next page)

(cont'd from front page) His every thought, word, action, decision; his 'very reason for being', all, were lived out of his divinity, out of love. He was in it to the end.

Today, Jesus invites us, as he does every year when we remember his passion on this, Passion Sunday, into an unshakeable relationship of limitless love with our Father, a relationship of trust and forgiveness, a relationship of the cross. He invites us to live every day, not out of our human tendencies and frailties but out of our union with God, out of the divine within us and in doing so to become love. Jesus invites us "to take a clear and unambiguous stand with" our God, to walk our lives with only one pair of footprints in the sand, our footprint firmly and seamlessly planted in God's footprint of our lives. It is then that we will pray, "Not what I want, but your will be done."
