SUNDAY October 18, 2020 Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time

On Fraternity and Social Friendship, Pope Francis' most recent encyclical, he writes about shadows over the closed world are spreading everywhere, leaving injured people by the roadside, cast out and discarded. The shadows plunge humanity into confusion, loneliness, and desolation. Pope Francis is reminding us, politicians that there is no others, no them, ...there is only us and we must have an open heart and an open world where we live as one, and he reminds leaders of the world we need a better kind of politics for the common and universal good. We are bothers and sisters all, and we must walk the paths or re-encounter ...brothers...sisters all! Shadows over the closed world is an ominous image of what is and what could be! We must share the suffering, ease the burden!

Both sides may actually claim today's gospel with Jesus' concluding statement, "Repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God," as an argument in favor of their position, up against the position of the other side. Well, Jesus' answer shows that he doesn't see the question as "either...or": "Repay to Caesar...and to God...." Jesus does not discredit or discard political authorities but simply puts them into perspective. For him, politics and religion have their own autonomy. It is not with kind words, however, that Jesus responds to the attempt of the Pharisees to trap him. The core line of the response: "Give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar, and to God what belongs to God", is often quoted. In some circles you hear it quoted to discredit those who mix religion and politics or economics. But the answer of Jesus is much more nuanced, and also more challenging than it is often given credit for. We may get a sense of that when we take a closer look at the argument of Jesus. He asked them to produce a coin. So they did, and Jesus took the coin, tossed it head-side up and asked, "Whose face is that?" They answered, "It is the emperor's" That was enough for Jesus, who said, "If that is the emperor's face, give to the emperor what is his."

But Jesus does not leave it at that. On the contrary, now he is ready to give his real answer, an overall ruling answer: "Give to God what is God's". We may wonder what Jesus is referring to. But we really do not have to look that far. If the coin is to be given to the emperor, because it bears the emperor's face, then the reality which bears God's face is of necessity to be given to God. We could still avoid the issue by pretending not to know what bears God's image. It is we! We, human beings, we are created in God's image, we carry God's face. That is the one source of our dignity, but it is also the basis of the immense task that is ours.

What follows is that we give ourselves back to God. What we owe God is not just an hour a week in church; it is not a church building; it is not primarily beautiful liturgies and endless prayers. All that is good, of course. All that can help and we should not give up on it. And yet, what God really wants us to give him is a well-organized, a well-cared for human life for all. And this is because humanity, all of us individually and all of us together, are created in God's image. What God wants back from us, the kind of worship God expects from us is a society in which all human beings can live in freedom, in dignity, in justice, and in peace. That is the tax we owe to God.

People in love behave differently. They "never stand still," Pope Francis declares. "They're drawn out of themselves; they're attracted and attract others in turn." Believers are lovers in this way, feeling the irresistible urge to share the blessings of faith. That is why, the Pope concludes, we must all be missionaries. On this World Mission Sunday, we embrace the call to be lovers of our suffering world. The Rosary's Sorrowful Mysteries hold the keys: Bring global suffering to prayer, be willing to suffer for the truth, bear wrongs patiently, share the burdens of others, and know what's worth sacrificing for.
