SUNDAY September 15, 2019 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The first reading in this past week's reading was from Colossians. The ideals of Saint Paul rest on the basis that baptized believers really are "God's chosen ones." If that is our core identity, we need our lifestyle to reflect that identity. Generosity and love are not beyond our power as "holy and beloved." God has drawn us into Christ's life, as members of his body, so that divine grace animates us like breath or blood. Because Christ is already alive within us, our lives must be rich in love, kindness, patience and generosity.

For me, the whole spiritual scene comes down to one concept. Theologian Paul Tillich called it, "accepting acceptance". The concept is

simple. The idea is that God accepts us (with all our faults and sins) but we do not easily accept His acceptance. The point is that God loves all humans. The job of humans is to accept the fact that God loves us. We simply need to "accept acceptance" Is that not the theme of the Gospel parables today! A god who searches for us and waits for us to come home to him... to accept acceptance! The parables today shine a light on accepting acceptance.

Today we have three parables from Luke. They are lost and found parables. They can help us accept acceptance! Why did Jesus tell these parables? Why do we need to hear them? The Gospel today portrays an image of God so beautiful, so intimate that I am left wondering where we got it wrong or why we don't get it. The image that Jesus gives us of God does not fall into line with the kind of God we are more comfortable with. I mean the kind of God, who in his dealings with us, should go by some clearly established rules and guidelines. We figure that if we live a relatively decent life, God had better take notice. We want to earn our salvation. We figure that our observance of the law must count for something; otherwise why keep the law? We figure that if we have done something wrong and if we have done the appropriate penance, then God owes us his forgiveness.

It is that kind of reasoning that Jesus challenges. Standing before God, we have nothing to show for ourselves; we can lay no claim. That is not to our disadvantage, but to our advantage. If there is one quality that characterizes the God that Jesus reveals, it is that God's dealings with us do not resemble a commercial transaction. It is not at all like that between God and us. And that is the Good News. What comes from God to us is compassion unearned; is love freely given; is grace gratuitously bestowed, and all this without limits. It is hard to comprehend that human beings can love so deeply, can forgive. While the poet Alexander Pope observed, "To err is human; to forgive, divine," we know the baptized have enough of a spark of divinity to forgive as we have been forgiven. This story continues to comfort and disturb us because we know Jesus is right. It is good to be home after my annual pilgrimage home to the place that formed me.
