Twinning with St. Patrick's Parish

SUNDAY - **September 22, 2024 Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time**

One would really expect better of the disciples. Although they had spent so much of their time in the company of lesus, saw so much of his behaviour and heard so much of his preaching they were still wide of the mark in their understanding of greatness and service. Jesus himself set the pattern of real service: "though he was in the form of God.. he emptied himself, assuming the condition of a slave" (Phil. 2:6f.) In the Gospel of Mark Jesus predicts his passion three times within quite a short period of time. The first is in chapter eight (8:31-33) and takes place in Caesarea Philippi just after Peter's profession of faith which was our Gospel last Sunday. The disciples are slow on the uptake but gradually they begin to get the message. This news about a forthcoming passion is hard for them to grasp and that's why lesus repeats it on several occasions. Does our world get it? The meek may one day inherit the Earth. But only after the strong and aggressive ones have blown each other to smithereens. Worldly power, as history has taught us, does not surrender its privileges without a fight. When the meek get in the crosshairs of what is deemed advantageous to the powerful, they quickly become an endangered species. The church champions the preferential option for the poor because Jesus did; and frankly, few else will. There's no money in standing up for the disadvantaged; in fact, there's money to be lost in casting your resources in the direction of the lowly. If you're looking to get ahead, if you're hoping for worldly success, if your intention is greatness by all the usual measures, then do not involve yourself with the concerns of the poor. If, however, you hope to be great in the measure of God's kingdom, then by all means do forge a relationship with the meek that is genuine, proximate, and personally costly.

The way to greatness in the Kingdom, as noted, is by entering into real community with the lowly. When the disciples argued about who among them was first, Jesus placed a child in their midst—an irrelevant, powerless, nonperson by the standards of the ancient world. Not only does Jesus identify himself with such a shockingly negligible representative ("Whoever receives one such as this receives me"), but he also insists that when his disciples receive a child, God stands revealed in their midst. The first are last, the leader is the servant, God is in the child—does any of this make sense? Not by worldly standards. Nor is such a vision compatible with the ambition of those who have much and would obtain more. If we want to embrace the Kingdom vision, we must shake ourselves loose from the desire to climb, to possess, to be in charge, and to be invulnerable. The just one cannot protect himself or herself by definition. The just have only the confidence of the word of God, and it is enough.

We gather here in this Church week by week, we come here because of our faith, and we do so in order to pray and worship God together. We are Christ's disciples in the world today we are trying our level best to live the way he wants us to live, we try to refrain from struggling for position, we try to live out the prescriptions of the Gospel in our daily lives. We know that we frequently fail, but with the help of God we pick ourselves up and start again in the knowledge that we are moving towards the goal for which we long so much. (continued)

If anyone wants to be first, he must make himself last of all and servant of all. This teaching is at the heart of the Gospel. It is Jesus' recipe for discipleship. But be careful and notice what it doesn't mean. It doesn't mean putting yourself down all the time. It doesn't mean baseness before others. But the actual text says that Jesus wants us to be the servant of all. This sounds like a bit of a tall order, but it is actually all of a piece with serving Jesus. Our master gave his life for the whole human race. He valued each and every creature, he served even the lowest of the low. He did so not always in the way they expected but he changed their lives and through his actions enabled them to live in a new and better way. So, we should do no less. To put it at its simplest, we serve others in the way Jesus serves us.

In the presence of the disciples who seemed consumed with an ambition for power for its own sake Jesus identifies himself with the powerless, those who are most dependent on our care. Over against the ambition of the disciples to serve themselves, Jesus puts the ambition to serve him as he comes to us in and through the weakest members of society. In our gospel Jesus is putting before us what his family of disciples, what the church, is really about.
