

#### August 24, 2025

The Gospel today invites us to consider what happens when we let our guard down and walk with vulnerability into the radical inclusivity of Jesus. When Jesus was asked if only a few would be saved, the question betrayed the answer anticipated. Jesus refuses to put a number on the saved or erect a fence around the possibility of salvation. Jesus does say the gate is narrow—but anyone and everyone are welcome to walk through it. God isn't putting restrictions on salvation. It's ours to choose. Jesus refuses to supply a number of the saved but does revamp the thinking of who qualifies. Isaiah reminds us that people outside the original covenant will acknowledge and participate in the glory of God. The Good News is not the private property of the few but belongs to the world. In today's world of whose in and whose out we need to remind ourselves of these biblical truths!

In today's Gospel, Jesus is on his way to Jerusalem where he is to face his suffering and death. For Jesus that is the narrow door by which he is to enter. If we, as disciples of Jesus, are to be worth our salt, then it is for us to enter by our particular narrow door. That is not a matter of seeking a path of suffering and death. Jesus did not seek that path either, but he was prepared to accept that path if it were the result of remaining faithful to what needed to be done in the circumstances. The same applies to us. What the Gospel message tells us is that we should not be concerned primarily with whether we or others will be saved in the end or not. What is more important, and what should concern us more, is whether what needs to be done in fact, now gets done. It is a matter of seizing the opportunities that present themselves to us in the present to make our unique contribution to the coming about of God's Kingdom in bits and pieces.

Jesus does not at all say that only a few will be "saved." The whole thrust of the gospel of Luke, is that Jesus came to bring God's love and freedom to the entire world. The message of that Gospel is that there is not a single person, not a single people, nation, race, or class, which is excluded from experiencing the love and liberation that God offers. The primary role then of a Christian community has never been simply to guarantee the "salvation" of its own members. It is not the function of the Church to turn all its energy inyo seeing that its members "save their souls" and sometimes pray for those in "outer darkness." What does it mean, "Being saved"? Realistically, to be "saved" means to live and to die in a close loving relationship with God, with others and with God's creation. All that is necessary to be "saved" is really to love each other in the name and the spirit of Jesus. When we enter the final and everlasting banquet, Jesus tells us, we will be surprised at those enjoying the feast...[continued page 3]


#### Register for RCIA to become Catholic

#### Social Justice Ministry Project: UVIC Food Insecurity

With the rising costs in academic studies and accommodations, media and on campus sources have reported that managing to survive as a student at UVic is becoming increasingly difficult. Education is essential but costs for purchasing basic food and personal care items can be prohibitive on a student budget.

With the assistance of our new UVic/Camosun Catholic Chaplin, Fr. David Shulist, S.J., our Social Justice committee (SEJC) has identified how our Holy Cross parishioners can help provide some basic relief for those students. At the Interfaith Chapel, nonperishable food and personal care items that have been donated from various sources are made available free to students in need. The need is growing.

Starting in September at Holy Cross, the SEJC will be organizing a collection of items in support of Food Security at UVic and will be appealing to the amazing generosity of our parishioners to purchase and donate these items by the last Saturday and Sunday of each month. Collection bins will be made available in the foyer at the entrance of the church. Delivery to the Interfaith Chapel will be

arranged at the end of each month. Each new month will bring appeals for different items. The first appeal in September will be for nonperishable protein items. In consecutive months, on the  $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$  Saturday and Sunday, requests for new items will be made in the bulletin and included in the announcements at the Masses.
