September 28, 2025

This Sunday, September 28th, is the 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time. In the Gospel according to Luke, Jesus tells the wealthy Pharisees the parable of the rich man and the poor man. The rich man had many possessions and lived a self-indulgent life, ignoring the needs of people around him. The poor man, named Lazarus, starved and suffered from diseases. When the rich man and Lazarus died, their circumstances changed dramatically. The rich man was tortured in Hades and Lazarus joined Abraham in peace and comfort. Distressed, the rich man asked Lazarus to warn his brothers to not live selfishly as he had done, so that his brothers could avoid being sent to Hades.

The rich man was convinced that he would have changed his ways if a dead person had brought him a message from God. But that is hard to believe. Lazarus had been lying at the gate of the rich man, begging for food. It would not have been possible for the rich man to go in and out of his property without seeing and hearing Lazarus. But he chose to close his eyes and ignore the suffering he could have relieved. Would a messenger from the dead really have moved his heart? Abraham did not think so and denied the request of the rich man.

We know that from time to time we all slip up. Sometimes, we are blind to the needs of people around us. What does Abraham's decision, not to help the rich man, imply about an all loving and forgiving God? Does it mean that if we do not follow all the commandments perfectly, we will suffer torment and not be forgiven? No, that is not what Jesus is saying! The purpose of the parable is to highlight that God respects our freedom! God gives us everything! Anything good that we do, we can only do through His grace! But we always have a choice! We choose to open our hearts to hear His voice. We choose to respond to His love and mercy by loving and forgiving others. When we lack the strength and will to be caring, we choose to ask God for that needed strength and will. We choose to follow the God that loves and forgives. Following this loving God helps us become aware of the needs of the people of the world. We become aware of what we can do to alleviate the suffering of creation. We were given free will and every moment of every day, we have the freedom to choose love and compassion.

Father Ron Rolheiser (a Canadian Oblate Priest and Theologian) wrote: "Unlike most everything else that's trying to get our attention, God never tries to overwhelm us. God, more than anyone else, respects our freedom. For this reason, God lies everywhere, inside us and around us, almost unfelt, largely unnoticed, and easily ignored, a quiet, gentle nudge; but, if drawn upon, the ultimate stream of love and energy."




What's New In Our Library
